This year, students entering 3rd grade will be given a summer assignment, which they will be required to complete by the first day back in September. - d) Bring the reading log along with your completed project with you on your first day of third grade. For any projects that do not have anything which you can bring back to school, you may simply describe the project on the attached sheet.

- Write a poem or song inspired by the book.
- Create a math problem using characters or facts from the book.

- Write a journal entry about the book.
